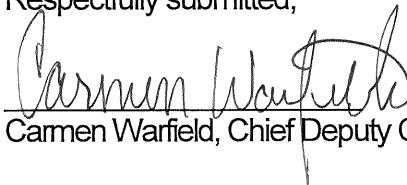

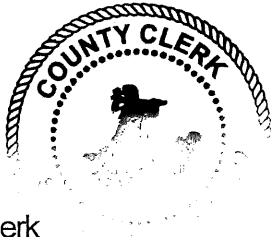

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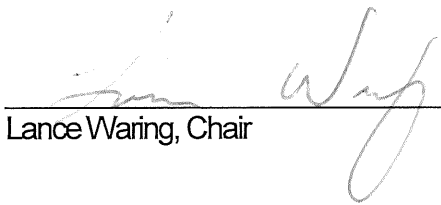

Recreation amid virus takes environmental toll

and elsewhere, vandalism has been reported, trash has piled up and new channels for destructive erosion have multiplied.

Dog poop has always been a problem.

"Now human waste has become a big problem," says Kelly Prendergast, chair of Indian Peaks Wilderness Alliance, working to protect the mosaic popularly reached from Boulder County.

Volunteers were astonished by what they saw in 2020, she says.

"It was like Fourth of July every day."

Disturbing details emerged from all corners of the state. Wood was pilfered from historic mining structures around the Ice Lakes area in the San Juan Mountains, rangers there reported. They counted double or triple the number of usual hikers on the trail, hundreds scouring sensitive alpine tundra.

Perhaps 2020 was an anomaly, some think. Amid the pandemic, with bars and restaurants, theaters and other city diversions unavailable, and with many Coloradans out of work, the mountains became the ultimate recourse. That much is clear.

But perhaps 2020 was a sign of what's to come.

"I think people who have found that they love outdoor recreation are going to keep coming back," says Reid Armstrong, public affairs specialist for Arapaho and Roosevelt national forests. "I don't think the numbers are going to decline that much now."

Which begs the question: Could crowd control strategies tried in the summer of COVID-19 be here to stay?

At the Hessie trailhead, for example, the ranger district partnered with sheriff's deputies.

"They were turning people around by the hundreds on busy weekends after parking was full," Armstrong says.

North of there, at Brainard Lake, a timed entry-system was tried. Arapaho National Forest's most famous destination, Mount Evans Scenic Byway, remained closed, as public health guidelines made opening tricky, Armstrong says.

"We're beginning to have conversations on what to do next year."

Such conversations are ongoing well beyond that summit.

Reservations continue to be enforced at the Manitou Incline, the iconic trail in Manitou Springs that local leaders closed in March under an emergency order. Similarly, in an announced effort to prevent the coronavirus spread, Rocky Mountain National Park enacted a booking system over the summer that some onlookers see as the future for other overrun national parks in the West.

Another reservation system was born this summer at another Colorado natural treasure: the Maroon Bells. Beyond that scenic area, in the Maroon-Snowmass Wilderness, reservations and permits could soon be required, says Fitzwilliams, who oversaw reservations rolled out in 2019 for Hanging Lake near Glenwood Springs.

And he expects more talks regarding more "management scenarios" at other sites under siege, mentioning spots near Vail and Summit County in particular. Above Breckenridge, at the base of Quandary Peak, 14,000-foot summit fever once again led to overflow on the adjacent highway, the lines of cars on either side of the road and jammed parking lot causing hazards for emergency vehicles.

"If things keep growing the way they are, it's inevitable that some of these areas are going to have to have some management scenarios, either permits or reservations or some sort of those types of tools," Fitzwilliams says.

"It's just the way it is. The old days aren't here anymore."

In the old days, there were more staff and resources, Fitzwilliams says. Since he started at White River National Forest 11 years ago, the budget he oversees has plunged 45 percent, he says. The busiest national forest serves as a microcosm for broader cuts to the U.S. Forest Service over recent years.

"We're hitting a point where we can't keep going down while the use (of lands) and output keeps going up," Fitzwilliams says.

The state's Department of Natural Resources has recognized the issue. At the direction of Gov. Jared Polis, the department has been tasked with formalizing federal, state and local partnerships dedicated to recreation and conservation.

Regional partnerships, Tim Mauck, the department's deputy executive, calls them. The idea is to combine money and manpower and identify priorities, he says.

"The recreation economy is one of those economies that we see as a renewable and sustainable resource, but there's a level of stewardship that goes along with that," he says. "We gotta be proactive in terms of maintaining that balance, to keep what's special about Colorado truly special."

In central and northern Colorado, the collaboration has been "super important," Armstrong says. It fosters "a landscape approach," she says.

"The squeeze-the-balloon analogy," she says. "If we try to do some restriction over here, everyone's going to move to another spot, and that's going to be another issue."

Despite the many issues of 2020, Armstrong sees a silver lining.

"Hopefully it will translate into people starting to love a place," she says. "This is their land. Helping to care for it like your own backyard — that's the place we want everybody to be."

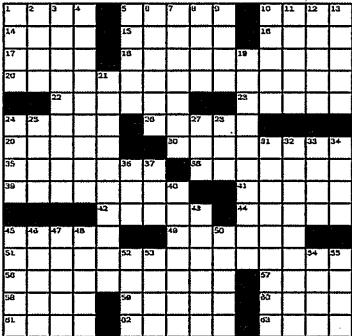

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**RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, SAN MIGUEL
COUNTY, COLORADO, REGULATING ACTIVITIES ON COUNTY ROADS AND
COUNTY RIGHTS-OF-WAY, ADOPTING ROAD AND BRIDGE PERMIT
STANDARDS AND ESTABLISHING FEES AND BONDING REQUIREMENTS**

Resolution # 2021- 03

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. § 42-4-510 and 42-4-511, as amended, San Miguel County (“County”) is authorized to regulate the size and weight of vehicles traveling upon the County road system, and to require that vehicles which exceed size and weight restrictions obtain permits prior to using County roads; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. § 42-4-510(3), as amended, the County is authorized to issue or withhold permits for vehicles which exceed the size and weight limitations established by statute, and if such permit is issued, to limit the number of trips, or to establish seasonal or other time limitations within which vehicles may be operated on the County roads indicated, or otherwise to limit or prescribe conditions of operation of such vehicles when necessary to protect the safety of highway users, to protect the efficient movement of traffic from unreasonable interference, or to protect the County roads from undue damage to the road foundations, surfaces, or structures and may require such undertaking or other security as may be deemed necessary to compensate for any injury to any highway or highway structure; and

WHEREAS, C.R.S. § 42-4-512, as amended, provides that no person shall drive, operate, or move upon or over any highway or highway structure any vehicle, object, or contrivance in such a manner so as to cause damage to said highway or highway structure, and such person shall be liable for any such damage caused regardless of the weight or size of the vehicle and whether or not the person has obtained a permit authorizing the activity causing the damage. Every person violating the provisions of C.R.S. § 42-4-512 shall be liable for all damage which said highway or highway structure may sustain as a result of such usage or activity. Whenever the driver of such vehicle, object, or contrivance is not the owner of same but is operating, driving, or moving such vehicle, object, or contrivance with the express or implied consent of the owner, then the owner or driver shall be jointly and severally liable for any such damage; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. § 43-2-111, as amended, the Board of County Commissioners (“BOCC”) is responsible for the construction and maintenance of the County road system. The County road supervisor (“County Road and Bridge Director” or “Director”) is legally vested with the power to prevent damage to County roads from ditch overflows, insufficient or unsafe conduits, flumes, or ditches crossing such roads, the removal or disposition of any material injurious to such roads, unsafe railway or tramway crossings, or any other cause which may arise and which comes under the jurisdiction of the BOCC; and

WHEREAS, the fees and bonding requirements for disturbances to the County road system and rights-of-way are set forth herein as Schedule A and may be amended or revised at any time as deemed necessary by the BOCC; and

WHEREAS, the minimum insurance amounts that may be required and are set forth herein as Schedule B and may be amended or revised at any time as deemed necessary by the BOCC; and

WHEREAS, this Resolution concerning the Regulation of Activities within County Road Rights-of-Way and adopting road and bridge permit standards and bonding/fee schedules effectively rescinds and replaces prior Resolutions 1978-69, 1979-4, 1996-23, and 1996-24 in their entirety.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF SAN MIGUEL COUNTY, COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:

- A. Any person, or persons, agents or employees of these persons must, prior to any excavation, or disturbance of any facet of a County road, right-of-way or appurtenance thereto which is included on the County road system within the boundaries of the San Miguel County, Colorado, comply with certain restrictions as listed below.
 1. All activities subject to this Resolution can be commenced only upon written approval of the San Miguel County Board of County Commissioners and/or that of the County Road and Bridge Director or his designated representative. Should the Director fail or refuse to issue any permit applied for pursuant to this Resolution, the applicant for same may appeal such failure or refusal to the BOCC. Any such appeal shall be made in writing to the BOCC, with a copy to the Director, and filed with the BOCC within ten days of the failure or refusal to grant a permit. Within ten days of the receipt of an appeal, the BOCCs shall schedule the matter to be heard at a noticed public meeting of the Board, to be held within thirty days of receiving the appeal. No less than five working days prior to the date at which the BOCC is scheduled to consider an appeal the party filing the appeal shall be given written notice of the time, date, and place at which the appeal will be considered, and at which, evidence may be received from applicant, Director, and interested members of public.
 2. Each and every activity other than normal public use of County roads, right-of-ways and appurtenances will be considered as within the purview of this resolution. Activities not considered normal public use include, but are not limited to: (1) utility excavation, relocation, repair or placement of facilities, (2) private maintenance of County roads, (3) filming of commercials when road conditions are altered, or any activity where the flow of traffic or road conditions are altered, (4) the operation of any vehicles, or equipment, upon a County road which exceed the size and/or weight restrictions set forth in C.R.S. §§ 42-4-501 through 42-4-512, as amended, or the operation of any hauling estimated to be in excess of 3,000,000 pounds within a twelve month period beginning with the date of the permit approval over a specified County road haul route.

3. Each and every activity shall be considered a separate incident, and each will require bonding or the posting of other acceptable security according to the nature and scope of activity and to the satisfaction of the Board of County Commissioners and/or the Road and Bridge Director. (See attached Schedule A – Bonding and Fees) The amount of bonding or other security must be adequate to cover all reasonably foreseeable damages as determined by the Director in accordance with the provisions of this Resolution.

Note: The following activities may also require a County Development and/or Special Use Permit:

- Utility extension over 1,000 feet
 - Any disturbance within 100 feet of wetlands
 - Hauling between 60,000 pounds and 3,000,000 pounds of materials subject to Land Use Code requirements in a twelve month period.
4. In the event of damages being repaired by other than County personnel, all aspects of the work performed must be guaranteed as to the quality of workmanship and materials employed for at least one year from the date of completion of repairs. Completed repairs must be inspected and approved by the Director or his designated representative.
 5. Each applicant, or their designee, involved in any of the above referenced activities must take all necessary precautions to protect the public from any danger attributable to said activities and must hold the County, its agents or employees harmless and free forever of all liabilities concerning the same.
 6. In the event that the requirements herein are not satisfied at all times, by decision of the BOCC and/or Director the bond posted shall be forfeited, payable to the County, and those who failed to perform must pay any and all additional expenses incurred, including all legal fees, construction costs, and additional damages necessary and pertinent to the case.
 7. All repairs must be made to return the road, right-of-ways, and appurtenances to a condition equal to or exceeding their pre-construction condition.
 8. Special Conditions may be attached to the approved permit with said conditions becoming an integral party of the permit requiring full compliance at all times. Special Conditions may include, but are not limited to; hours and days of operation, dust control, designation of routes, speed limits, backfill requirements, traffic control requirements, revegetation, and any other condition deemed necessary by the Director or his designated representative including a requirement to provide a certificate of insurance from the contractor's carrier naming "San Miguel County, Colorado" as an additional insured in the minimum amounts as set forth in Schedule B.
 9. No hauling or any other activity will be allowed when road conditions, weather conditions or visibility make traveling hazardous to the operator or the traveling public.

10. Those performing work, upon notice by the Director, or their designee, of failure to meet the standards and special conditions of this permit will immediately cease and desist from further action except protecting the public and private property from danger, until such notice is properly rescinded by County authority. Failure to fully comply with all conditions of the permit shall result in revocation of the permit and immediate stoppage of the work.
11. All emergency repair work done by County personnel within and upon a damaged area will be paid for by those having caused the damage at the County's current rental rate schedule and without recourse on the County, its agents or employees.
12. The applicant will be responsible for documentation, including photos or videotaping before and after construction activity. Otherwise, the applicant agrees to complete repairs or reclamation to the satisfaction of County Road and Bridge Department personnel based on their before and after visual inspection of the site.
13. In the event this permit is issued for the purpose of hauling material, the County makes no guarantee that the approved haul route will be adequate and the applicant assumes responsibility for all necessary improvements as well as continued maintenance under the supervision of County authority for the duration of the hauling.
14. The provisions of C.R.S. §§42-4-501 through 42-4-512, as amended, pertaining to the regulation of the size and weight of vehicles traveling upon public roads and highways, and establishing permitting fees and requirements for such vehicles, are incorporated herein by reference and shall apply to all vehicles, or combination of vehicles, traveling upon, or otherwise, using, the public roads within the County road system.
15. This Resolution is adopted for the purpose of protecting and preserving the public health, safety, and welfare. Should a court of competent jurisdiction find and declare that any specific provision or provisions of this Resolution are illegal, unconstitutional, or otherwise legally unenforceable, that specific provision or provisions shall be deemed to be severable from the remaining provisions of this Resolution, which shall remain in full force and effect. The provisions of San Miguel County Resolutions 1978-69, 1979-4, 1996-23, 1996-24 are hereby repealed as of the effective date of this Resolution. This Resolution shall be legally effective immediately upon passage.
16. Issuance of a Special Construction Permit does not relieve the permittee from obligation to comply with all applicable federal or town, rules or regulations, or state statutes including, but not limited to C.R.S. §§ 42-4-510, 42-4-511, 42-4-512, and 43-2-111 as amended. In addition all permittees shall be subject to the provisions of C.R.S. §§ 43-5-301 through 43-5-307 as amended.

 - A. Annual Permit \$ 400.00
 - B. Single Trip - \$15.00 + \$5.00 per axle
 - C. Special permits for structural, oversize or overweight moves requiring
 Extraordinary action, or moves involving weight in excess of 200,000 pounds for
 single trip permit \$ 125.00
- 5. Over length, over width and over height permits on loads which do not exceed legal weight limits
 - A. Annual Permit \$ 250.00
 - B. Single Trip \$ 15.00
- 6. For hauls estimated to exceed 3,000,000 pounds in a twelve month period over a specified County Road haul route \$ 250.00

REVEGETATION FEES

- 1. A fee calculated at the rate of \$.02 per sq. ft. of disturbance will be assessed permittees to insure that monitoring, mapping, observation and weed control are adequate after the soil disturbance takes place. Such fee shall apply only to disturbances that exceed 1,250 sq. ft. in length. The minimum fee shall be \$25 per disturbance.

2. Any roadside disturbances shall be revegetated upon completion of the work in accordance with recommendations from the San Miguel County Vegetation Management and Weed Control Department.

BONDS

The following bonding schedule is intended to be a guide, and the Board of County Commissioners or Road Superintendent may increase, decrease or eliminate the bond requirement after considering the scope of the project, location, time of year, contractor's previous performance or other pertinent circumstances.

The type of bond will be specified when the permit is issued.

1. Aboveground work in the ROW = \$2,000 or less, if required, to be determined by Road & Bridge Department personnel after a pre-construction inspection and consideration of the on-site conditions.
2. Distribution and Service utilities installation = \$2,000 minimum, to be determined by Road & Bridge Department personnel after a pre-construction inspection and consideration of the on-site conditions.
3. Installation of overhead utilities = \$250 per pole.
4. Private maintenance of County Roads = Minimum \$2,000 and \$1,000 per mile.
5. Overweight or oversize vehicles – bond to be determined after considering route, road surface type, distance and number of trips proposed.
6. All other activity or potential disturbance to County Roads – to be determined at the time of application.
7. Minimum bond for hauling in excess of 3,000,000 pounds in a twelve month period - \$2,000. Bond amount above the minimum will be determined after considering: number of loads, total weight, road conditions, and length of County Road haul route and seasonal factors.

SCHEDULE B
INSURANCE MINIMUMS

1. Standard Workman’s Compensation and Employer’s Liability, including occupational disease, covering all employees engaged in the performance of work at the site, in the amount required by State Statutes.

2. Comprehensive General Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance:

These rates are set by CGIA (“Colorado Governmental Immunity Act”) and are subject to change.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS
OF SAN MIGUEL COUNTY, COLORADO
REGULATING THE PARKING OF VEHICLES ON
COUNTY ROADS, PROPERTY AND ROAD RIGHT OF WAYS**

ORDINANCE NO. 2021-01

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. §30-15-401(1)(h), the Board of County Commissioners of San Miguel County, Colorado, ("Board") is authorized to adopt ordinances to control and regulate the movement and parking of motor vehicles on public property; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. §42-4-111(1)(a) and (c), the Board is authorized to regulate or prohibit the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles and to regulate traffic by means of Official Traffic Control Devices; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. §30-11-107(1)(a), the Board has the power to make such orders concerning property belonging to the County as it may deem expedient, and to perform such duties respecting County roads as may be required by law; and

WHEREAS, C.R.S. §42-4-1204(1), sets forth the areas that are appropriate for parking and stopping of vehicles; and

WHEREAS, C.R.S. §42-4-1803, the San Miguel County Sheriff, Undersheriff, Deputy Sheriff, or agency employee has authority to remove by towing any motor vehicle abandoned on public property or an unattended motor vehicle obstructing traffic or county road maintenance; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Board to set forth an orderly procedure to regulate parking of vehicles on county roads, property and road right-of-ways within the boundary of the Telluride R-1 School District.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF SAN MIGUEL COUNTY, COLORADO, as follows:

I. PARKING

A. DEFINITIONS

1. County Property: Any real property having its title, ownership, use, or possession held by San Miguel County to include parks, parking lots and developed or undeveloped land.
2. County Roadway: For purposes of this Ordinance, the "County Roadway" is defined as follows:
 - a. The road surface and County maintained drainage features of maintained County roads.

- b. Any platted right-of-way.
 - c. Any public right-of-way as defined in C.R.S. §43-2-201.
 - d. All areas within a cul-de-sac.
 - e. Designated snow plow turnarounds and all maintenance areas.
 - f. All designated emergency pull-outs and school bus turn-arounds.
3. Disabled Vehicle: A validly licensed and registered vehicle, trailer or camper that will not move under its own power due to mechanical failure, snow or other circumstances.
 4. Motor Vehicles: Any self-propelled vehicle that is designed primarily for travel on public highways and that is generally and commonly used to transport persons and property over the public streets and highways.
 5. Non-Commercial or Recreational Vehicle: A truck, or unladen truck tractor, operated singly or in combination with a trailer or utility trailer or a motor home, which truck, or unladen truck tractor, or motor home is used exclusively for personal pleasure, enjoyment, other recreational purposes, or personal or family transportation of the owner, lessee, or occupant and is not used to transport cargo or passengers for profit, hire, or otherwise to further the purposes of a business or commercial enterprise.
 6. Object: An "Object" includes by way of example and not limitation, construction materials/equipment, discarded articles and scrap materials.
 7. Park or Parking: The standing of a Vehicle, whether occupied or not, other than very briefly for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading property or passengers (C.R.S. §42-102(67)).
 8. Road & Bridge Permit: A County permit that may be obtained from the County Road and Bridge Department. Said Permit shall be issued on a case-by-case basis and will be restricted to a specific Vehicle or location.
 9. Trailer: Any wheeled Vehicle, without motive power, which is designed to be drawn by a Motor Vehicle and which is generally and commonly used to carry and transport personal effects, articles of household furniture, loads of trash and rubbish, horses, or other property over highways and County roadways.
 10. Vehicle: A device that is capable of moving itself, or of being moved, from place to place upon wheels or endless tracks, including but not limited to Motor Vehicles, Recreational Vehicles, and Trailers.

B. RESTRICTING PARKING IN DESIGNATED AREAS

1. The gross general areas defined for this policy are the same boundary lines for the Telluride R1 School District. The County may post signs pursuant to this Ordinance in areas determined to be adversely impacted by illegal or excessive Parking to:
 - a. limit the duration of Parking;
 - b. limit Parking on certain days and/or during designated hours;
 - c. provide notice that Vehicles Parked illegally in such areas are subject to impoundment; and/or
 - d. impose any other restrictions reasonably necessary to mitigate the Parking problem and associated harm.
2. The proper signage posted shall designate certain no parking areas including, but not limited to, the following areas: Bridal Veil, Trout Lake, Placerville, Ilium, Ophir, Ski Ranches and the San Miguel County Intercept Lot in Lawson Hill.

C. PARKING POLICY

1. Vehicles or other Objects shall not be parked, stored or abandoned in whole or in part on a County Roadway or on County Property where there is not designated parking unless one of the following conditions exist:
 - a. The Sheriff's Office has been notified that efforts are actively underway to have a Disabled Vehicle or Object removed.
 - b. During an infrequent event, including by way of example and not limitation, a family gathering, community meeting or garage sale, overflow Vehicles may be parked in whole or in part on a County Roadway or County Property only when:
 - i. said parking does not impede on a minimum of twelve (12) feet of traveled road surface if the road is designated to accommodate one lane of traffic;
 - ii. the Parked Vehicle allows both lanes to remain passable on a two-lane road;
 - iii. the Parked Vehicle does not create potential traffic or public safety hazard; or
 - iv. said parking is not overnight.
2. If there is no established public maintenance for snow removal (e.g. County or metro district) for an individual to access his/her property, the owner of an operable, validly licensed and registered vehicle may obtain a County Road & Bridge Permit

to park in whole or in part on a County Right-of-Way. This Permit will be issued only when:

- a. said Parking does not impede on a minimum of twelve (12) feet of traveled road surface if the road is designated to accommodate one lane of traffic;
 - b. the parked vehicle allows both lanes to remain passable on a two-lane road;
 - c. does not create potential traffic or public safety hazard; or
 - d. the area is cleared and maintained by the party as defined in the designated Road & Bridge Permit.
3. This Ordinance shall not apply to emergency vehicles responding to an emergency or in compliance with the directions of a law enforcement officer or official temporary traffic control device.

D. TRAFFIC HAZARD / SNOW REMOVAL

Notwithstanding the parking policy set forth in Section B herein, in the event a Vehicle creates an obstruction to traffic, is abandoned, impedes snow removal or scheduled road repair, or if it impedes emergency vehicles, the vehicle shall be removed immediately under the direction of the Sheriff, pursuant to C.R.S. §42-4-1803.

II. NOTICE OF VIOLATION

A. RED TAG ISSUANCE

Either an employee of the San Miguel County Road and Bridge Department or a Deputy Sheriff shall place a red tag on a Vehicle Parked on a County Roadway or on County Property to give the owner notice of the violation(s) of this Ordinance unless the Vehicle is to be removed immediately in accordance with Section I.D herein. The red tag shall require the owner to remove the vehicle within 24 hours. After expiration of 24 hours, red-tagged vehicles shall be deemed “abandoned motor vehicles” as defined in C.R.S. §42-4-1802(1)(b), unless the owner has conspicuously affixed to the vehicle a notice indicating the intention to return or has notified the Sheriff’s Office of intention to remove the vehicle within 24 hours.

B. TIME LIMITS

The time limit for compliance with a red tag shall be no more than 24 hours unless an arrangement has been approved with Section II.A. herein.

C. COURTESY CALL

The person placing the red tag may request the Sheriff’s Dispatcher to telephone, if possible, the vehicle owner as a courtesy to request the owner’s cooperation.

D. FOLLOW-UP

The person placing the red tag shall follow-up or arrange for a follow-up at the time of red tag expiration. If the tagged Vehicle remains in violation at the expiration of the red tag, it shall be towed in accordance with the Sheriff's Office's established procedures.

III. VEHICLE REMOVAL

A. SHERIFF ACTION

Should a tow be required, the tow shall be carried out under the direction of the Sheriff's Office in accordance with C.R.S. § 42-4-1803.

B. REPEAT VIOLATIONS

If a Vehicle has been previously red-tagged, the Vehicle may be towed immediately upon any additional violations of this Ordinance.

C. TOW FEES

Costs of towing and storage of Vehicles in violation of this Ordinance shall be the responsibility of the Vehicle owner. The County has no control over, and does not regulate, the rates charged by any tow company. No Vehicle shall be released from impoundment until the charges for impoundment and storage shall have been paid by the Vehicle owner.

D. ABANDONMENT OF IMPOUNDED VEHICLES

Any impounded Vehicle not claimed within seventy-two (72) hours of the time of impoundment shall be treated as abandoned. The provisions of C.R.S §42-4-1805, regarding abandoned Vehicles, shall apply to such Vehicles.

IV. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS

- A.** Notwithstanding other provisions contained herein, any person who violates any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a class 2 petty offense pursuant to C.R.S. §30-15-402. For each separate offense, the penalty for any person found to violate this ordinance shall be punished by fines of:

First Violation:	Two hundred fifty dollars	(\$250.00)
Second Violation:	Five hundred dollars	(\$500.00)
Subsequent Violations:	Five hundred dollars	(\$500.00)

- B.** The penalty assessment procedure provided for in C.R.S. §16-2-201 shall be followed for any violation of this Ordinance. Any person who violates any provision of this Ordinance shall be given a penalty assessment notice by the apprehending peace officer or by the designated County enforcement personnel. The penalty assessment notice shall be a summons and complaint which contains: (i) the identity of the alleged offender by name and address, (ii) specifies the offense with which the person is charged; (iii) states the fine which may be paid directly to the San Miguel County Treasurer at their office in

Telluride, CO, and (iv) states the requirement that the alleged offender either pay the fine to the San Miguel County Treasurer in person or by mail, at the address specified in the penalty assessment notice within fourteen days of such penalty assessment notice, or else be required to appear to answer the charge before the San Miguel County Court, at the County Courthouse in Telluride, CO, at the date and time specified in the penalty assessment notice. Any person who chooses to acknowledge that they are guilty of the charge specified in the penalty assessment notice may, within fourteen days of the date of issuance of the penalty assessment notice, pay a fine to the San Miguel County Treasurer either in person at the San Miguel County Courthouse in Telluride, CO or by mail to the County Treasurer's address as specified on the penalty assessment notice. Any such payment of the fine specified in the penalty assessment notice shall be accompanied by a copy of the penalty assessment notice signed by the person acknowledging their guilt. Timely payment of the optional fine specified in the penalty assessment notice shall relieve the person receiving such notice of any further obligation to appear in the San Miguel County Court, at the date and time specified in such notice, to answer the offense charged in the notice.

- C. All fines, penalties or forfeitures for the violation of this Ordinance, but not any surcharge imposed by the Court upon conviction pursuant to C.R.S. §30-15-402, shall be paid to the County Treasurer of San Miguel County, CO, within thirty days of the Court's receipt of any such fines, penalties, and/or forfeitures.
- D. Pursuant to C.R.S. §30-15-410, the San Miguel County Court shall have jurisdiction in prosecutions of violations of this Ordinance. The simplified county court procedures set forth in Part 1 of Article 2 of Title 16, C.R.S., and the penalty assessment procedures set forth in Part 2 of said Article shall be applicable to the prosecutions of alleged violations of this Ordinance. Any summons and complaint brought before the San Miguel County Court for the alleged violation of this Ordinance, shall be filed in the name of San Miguel County, by and on behalf of the people of the state of Colorado, and any process issued by the San Miguel County Court in such proceedings shall be likewise so denominated.
- E. All suits for the recovery of any fine and prosecutions for the commission of any offense made punishable under this Ordinance shall be barred if not commenced within one year after the commission of the alleged Ordinance offense pursuant to C.R.S. §30-15-409.
- F. Each violation of this Ordinance shall be deemed separate and distinct from any other violation of this Ordinance or of any other federal, state or local law, order or regulation.
- G. The penalty assessment procedure provided in this Ordinance is authorized to be followed by any arresting law enforcement officer for any such violation.

V. EFFECTIVE DATE

The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation and protection of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of San

Miguel County, Colorado. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption on second and final reading.

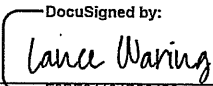

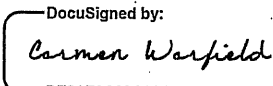

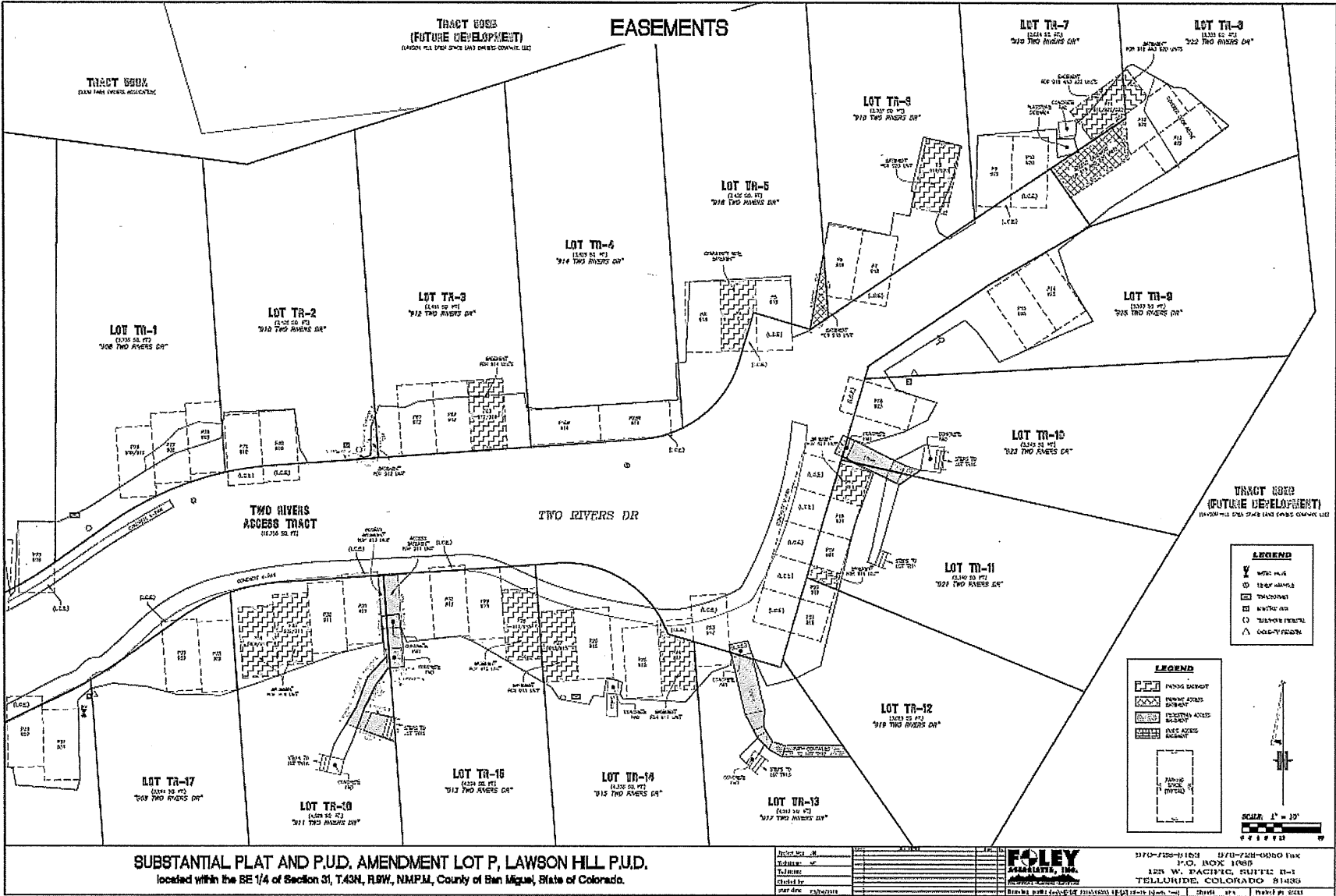
